The pretty small town of Blomberg, with approximately 15,000 inhabitants, is situated in the Lippe region between the Teutoburg Forest and the Weser Hills. The area is characterized by forests and gentle hills, and it is one of the most historically significant regions in North Rhine-Westphalia.

Blomberg was founded around 1250 by Bernhard III at a strategically important location between two trade routes. Today, you still enter the historic town center through the so-called "Niederntor," the only preserved old town gate in the Lippe region. The city centre includes over 250 timbered houses and sights like the medieval castle and the impressive town hall.

Blomberg is ideal for outdoor holidays thanks to its scenic landscape of rolling hills and its well-developed network of hiking and riding trails. You can also visit nearby areas like the Weser Hills, Hameln or Bad Pyrmont, as well as other regional attractions such as the Hermannsdenkmal, the Externsteine, or the open-air historical museum.

Blomberg is composed of eighteen villages, each of them with its own traditions and sights. The town also has a very active cultural life with events during the whole year.

By the way: Until today Blomberg's byname is »Nelkenstadt« (carnations' town or pinks' town) which alludes to a former carnation and pink breeding and important horticulture. This made Blomberg quite famous in the 19th century due to its horticultural importance.

The Town Hall

At the heart of the town, directly on the marketplace, you'll find one of the most impressive buildings from the Weser Renaissance period. The town hall, built in 1587, stands out with its distinctive architecture: a stone ground floor and a timbered upper level.



The Pillory

On the left side of the town hall you can find the pillory. Since the Middle Age, the pillory was used to punish people. They were attached to the pillory and publicly disgraced. The old pillory was replaced in 1616 by the current one.





The Alheyd-Fountain

The Alheyd Fountain in the marketplace tells the story of a poor woman in 1460. During the week after Easter, she stole altar bread from the Martinikirche (St. Martin's Church). Fearing revelation and punishment, she threw the bread into a well. Despite her efforts, she was caught, interrogated, and tortured in the old castle's cellar before being condemned and burned. The well later gained a reputation for miracles, and the Klosterkirche (Monastery Church) was built over it.



The Martiniturm and District Court

Next to the marketplace stands the "Martiniturm," the tower of the original St. Martin Church, built in the 13th century. The church was destroyed during a regional conflict in 1447, known as the Soest Feud, with only the tower surviving the fire. The church was later rebuilt but was demolished again in 1833. The district court was then built on the same site. Today, the former court building houses various divisions of the town's administration. Together with parts of the old castle and the city wall, the Martiniturm is one of Blomberg's oldest buildings.





Blomberg Castle

Blomberg Castle dates back to the 13th century, with some of its stone structure and ring wall likely from that period. In the Middle Ages, the castle served as the preferred residence of the Counts of Lippe. After being destroyed in 1447 during the Soest Feud, the castle was rebuilt, restored, and expanded. The impressive North and East wings, which gave the castle its Renaissance character, were added between 1560 and 1569. Until the 19th century, the castle also housed the regional administration of Blomberg.



The Niederntor (Lower Gate)

The Niederntor was likely built in the 14th century at the lowest point of the town, serving as the southern entrance to Blomberg. The gate was part of the town's stone wall and marked the entry point of the trading route Kölnische Landstraße, which was part of the Hellweg, connecting Dortmund, Paderborn and Horn. The gate's Renaissance design includes key-shaped shooting holes and bullet marks from around 1530. The clock de the gate was added in 1844. The Niederntor is the only remaining historical gate in the Lippe region.





The Klosterkirche (Monastery Church)

The Klosterkirche's origins trace back to the sacrilege of altar bread in 1460. A well into which the stolen bread was thrown, became a site of miracles, attracting many pilgrims. In 1468, Bernhard VII of Lippe invited Augustinian monks to Blomberg to care for the growing number of pilgrims. A chapel was built over the well in 1462, later expanded into the church we see today. The Klosterkirche became the spiritual center of Lippe, housing the tombs of the Lippe dynasty. After the demolition of the St. Martin Church in 1833, the Klosterkirche became the Protestant church of the town.



The Tomb

In the choir of the Klosterkirche you can see the tomb of Bernhard VII of Lippe and of his wife Anna from Holstein-Schaumburg. This is the most outstanding artwork in the church. It is made of fine sand stone and its creation is attributed to the famous Westphalian sculptor Heinrich Brabender. It has been built after the death of Bernhard in 1511.





The Altes Amtshaus (Old Bailiff's House)

Built in 1572, the Altes Amtshaus was originally part of Blomberg Castle. It served as the entrance building to the castle and the residence of the local lord's representative. Located near the castle garden and the "Schweigegarten," its richly decorated facade reflects the importance of its inhabitants during that time.



The Shoe Makers

From the 17th to the 20th century, shoemakers were the largest professional group in Blomberg. You can learn more about the shoemakers and the so-called "Shoemakers' Lantern" in an exhibition at the town library (Kuhstraße 16). For more information, visit: www.heimatverein-blomberg.de.



Sights

Gardens and Parks

Blomberg is home to several green spaces that offer a peaceful retreat. The "Weinberggasse" (Vineyard Lane) hints at Blomberg's past as a vineyard town. Today, you can relax in places like the "Groene Plaats," the castle garden ("Burggarten"), or the "Schweigegarten." From the small tower in the Schweigegarten, you can enjoy stunning views of the fields and villages surrounding Blomberg.



The Carnation Sculptur

Since 2020, a large carnation sculpture greets visitors at the town's entrance, symbolizing Blomberg's historical connection to carnation cultivation. It is said to be the "world's largest carnation." It was created by a local artist: Hans Kordes.

The Bürgerheim

This building was originally a typical pub from the second half of the 19th century. In 1925, it became a meeting place for the Socialist Party, workers, and various cultural associations, offering a venue for less wealthy citizens. However, this activity came to an end in 1929.

During World War II, the building was repurposed. In 1943, the company "Phoenix Klemmen" relocated from the Ruhr area to Blomberg due to bombing raids in Essen. The company started to produce in the Bürgerheim's dance hall and quickly grew. By 1957, the company moved to its own facility, and the Bürgerheim resumed its original role as a bar and restaurant, known for hosting parties for the less wealthy. Today, "Phoenix Contact" is the region's largest employer.





Der All Electric Society Park

How is energy generated through wind power? What does the inside of a wind turbine look like? What happens when the sun shines on solar cells? And how can electric vehicles be charged using renewable energy sources?

These questions are clearly answered for young and old alike in the park All Electric Society. The All Electric Society represents a scientifically grounded vision of a CO2-neutral and sustainably developing world. Therefore, the park focuses entirely on renewable energy, including how it is generated, stored, and used efficiently.

The new entrance gate to the corporate headquarters at the beginning of Flachsmarkstraße illustrates how the All Electric Society can become a reality through the energy flow—from generation to conversion, storage, distribution, and optimized energy use. The park is a scaled-down representation of the real world. A distinguishing feature is a solar tree with a diameter of 12 meters located in the roundabout, which always aligns itself at the correct angle to the sun. Visitors to the park can explore approximately 8,000 m² of transparent glass cubes that demonstrate the various steps along the energy flow. Renewable energy generation is represented through the themes of solar and wind energy. The efficient use of this energy is made tangible through examples of electromobility and energy-optimized buildings. Interactive stations invite to participation and exploration.

The grounds are open to the public and can be visited at any time. The cubes are open from 7:00 AM to 9:00 PM. There is no cost associated with the visit.

Blomberg City Walk

On a stroll through the Carnation City, you will explore our historic old town and discover numerous sights, such as the Town Hall, the Martin Tower, the Niederntor, and much more. This map will guide you along the route.

Through a winding approach at the "Weinberg," you enter the city of Blomberg through the "Niederntor," the only remaining city gate in Lippe. The well-preserved historic city center has been renovated in recent years and today comprehands about 250 half-timbered houses as an impressive testament to history. From the grand merchant houses on Langer Steinweg to the homes of craftsmen and farmers, as well as the small houses of linen weavers and day laborers in the wall alleys, the different living conditions of various population groups in the city are evident.

Following Langer Steinweg, the old main street of Blomberg with its stately gabled houses, you reach the market square with the Town Hall built in 1587. Here begins the historical city tour. The starting point is the Alheyd Fountain in the marketplace, which commemorates the Host Theft of 1460 and the subsequent pilgrimage to the "Blomberg Miracle Fountain."

Parking options: including Pideritplatz (P2), Alte Meierei (P1, Brinkstraße), Diekmannstraße parking deck, and the Am Weinberg parking garage.

Bus lines stop at the Town Hall, and tour buses can park behind the Schießhalle (Alter Dreschplatz).



Historical sight seeing tour





Blomberg offers a wide variety of events throughout the year, from small concerts to large fairs with catering to every taste. Many events still reflect Dutch cultural influence, as Blomberg was a base for the Dutch military until the late 1990s. Today, many Dutch citizens continue to live in Blomberg, and one of the highlights is the Dutch Christmas Market.

Warrior-Hike (April)

Spring market (May)

Local and regional traders offer a wide selection of flowers, handicrafts, organic products, cheese, vegetables, and more. In addition, local retailers open their doors for Sunday shopping.

Nelkenfest with Bloemencorso (June/July)

Blomberg's biannual Carnation Festival celebrates the town's connection to carnations and pinks. Highlights include live music performances in the historical town center, a grand flower parade on Sunday, and the coronation of the new Carnation Queen.





Vier-Abende-Marsch (Four Evenings March) (Juni)

On four consecutive days, hikers, walkers and joggers are sent out on the route around Blomberg. A different route every evening. With so many school classes, it is customary for parents to give their children additional marching provisions on the way to the two official supply points.

The Schützenfest (July)

The "Alte Blomberger Schützenbataillon von 1576" is one of the oldest and most important associations in Blomberg. With its historical origin (the defence of the town), the association with sub-divisions in diffents parts of the town and in some of the villages is today responsible for one of the most impressive events in the town centre. Processions and live music, a green and flowery decoration of the old town and many historically inspired highlights make the "Schützenfest" a very special town party with dancing events until late at night. The Schützenfest is organised every second year in alternation with the Nelkenfest.

The Blomberger Kunstmauer (Wall of Art) (August)

This open-air exposition along the old wall of the city with different types of styles and with local and regional artists is unique. You can find catering and live music at various locations. More: www.kunstmauer-blomberg.de





Blomberger Summer Sounds (August)

Under the title "Blomberg Sommerklänge" the city presents an annual cultural program in cooperation with Blomberg Marketing. The events take place in the Schweigegarten, located next to the castle wall, and feature a wide variety of performances, including readings, comedy, jazz, country, folk, and pop music.

The Wilbaser Markt (September)

The Wilbaser Markt is one of the largest funfairs in the region, featuring approximately 300 market stands and various amusement rides. Held in the fields near Blomberg, this lively event attracts visitors from all over. For more information: <u>www.wilbaser-markt.de</u>.

The Blomberger Songfestival (November)

This two-day event presents local, national, and international singersongwriters, presenting their latest songs and albums. The Sint Nicolaas-Market (first Advent week-end)

During this tiny Christmas market with Dutch flair you can have the chance to meet "Sint Nicolaas" and his "Pieten". Children 's rally

The exciting rally takes the children to some of the most beautiful spots in the historic old town. At several stations, including sights like the Town Hall and the Niederntor, they need to answer questions. Sometimes the answers are easy to find, and other times they require a closer look... In the end, a word must be discovered. Once the answer is found, the children can come to the Tourist Information and pick up a small reward.



The vineyard (Weinberg)

A historical map of the 18th century shows a vineyard in the area below the old town wall from the castle to the Niederntor. This vineyard disappeared later, probably due to climate changes and toll issues. In 2005, a new vineyard was planted on a 100 m² plot with 99 plants.

In cooperation with the winery, this project was intensified and expanded. From the harvested grapes, a Blomberg jelly was made, which can be purchased at the Tourist Information.




Charging Stations in Blomberg


